1750 house in a modern subdivision

A local businessman has rebuilt the gray and maroon manor house in the Ivy Hill subdivision much as it was in 1750 - including five-foot closets and bedrooms with sloping ceilings.

But "we had to be practical and try to adapt it to today's use," so electricity and plumbing were installed, said Bob Sowder, president of Sentry Realty Inc.

As much of the original materials as possible were salvaged, but the house was "so far gone we had to take it down to the foundation," he

Several of the beams used to build the house in 1750 lay outside

the home on Manor House Drive. And Mr. Sowder points out the knife remain.

The wooden floor near the front door was almost worn through because of heavy use. Mr. Sowder said. So it was replaced with some planks from the second-story floor.

Workers also hand made doors to fit closets and some awkward-sized openings to rooms.

The Ivy Hill farm first belonged to the Edmonds family. Capt. Elias Edmonds, who fought in the American Revolution, and his wife Elizabeth Miller built the house and named it Ivy Hill.

The captain's son became owner of the 887-acre farm in 1840 when hisfather died.

The farm was prosperous until the 1860s when it suffered greatly from the effects of the war when

most of its 22 slaves left. Over the years, the home passed into the Blackwell family and Eliza-



are nearby.

The Realtor, his partner G. P. Johnston and four or five men have worked on and off for 21/2 years on the house which they hope to complete in 30 to 45 days.

The 2700-square-foot house -"total reproduction" — has four bedrooms, 21/2 baths and seven fireplaces, and is on a lot slightly less than one acre.

Mr. Sowder hopes to "break even" when he sells the house for \$250,000.

"It would have cost a lot less if I'd torn it down and started from stratch," he admitted.


Warrenton's reservoir and woods.

Mr. Sowder said he often spots deer, beavers and other wildlife in the backyard.

The home is ideal for "someone who's interested in history and in preservation and who can afford it ... Someone has to be willing to pay for more than just basic housing. It's one of a kind," he said.

The Realtor started the Ivy Hill subdivision of Victorian and Williamsburg-style homes about six years ago.

He also has restored other homes and offices in the area and tries to start at least one such project each
