Nursing Program Receives National Re-Accreditation through Spring 2030

If you haven't heard the good news, the associate of applied science in nursing degree program has been granted continuing accreditation through spring 2030 through the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN). The program first received accreditation by ACEN in 2017. Both the U.S. Department of Education and the Council for Higher Education

Commission recognize ACEN as the accrediting body for nursing programs.

"This is a very high bar to achieve and is definitely something to celebrate!" said Laurel Ridge President Kim Blosser. "It's an important validation that our nursing program meets high standards of educational quality."





Laurel Ridge Welcomes New Dean of Health Professions

Dr. Scott Vanderkooi, EdD, NRP, joined Laurel Ridge this summer as the new dean of health professions. He previously served as associate dean and EMS program director at Blue Ridge Community College in Virginia.

"Laurel Ridge has the ability to directly impact our community—healthcare in particular—in so many positive ways,"

said Dr. Vanderkooi. His goal is to build a more holistic experience that exposes students to the rapidly changing environment of medicine, including advancements in medical research, technological changes, interprofessional collaboration, and effective soft skills. In May, 55 students earned an associate degree in nursing from Laurel Ridge. Of those graduates, 27 received a total of 63 scholarships or emergency assistance grants from the Laurel Ridge Foundation, adding up to \$110,000 in support.
